
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








A Personal Word

Tribute to Dr. Long

r. Ron Long
was born July
24, 1937, in Rock Hill, South
Carolina, and passed away May
30, 2019, at the age of 81. He
came to faith and was baptized
when he was 12 years old at
West End Baptist Church in Rock
Hill.

A fan of the University of South Carolina football team, Long played when he was young, but decided to forego the collegiate level in order to fulfill his calling to the ministry. Instead, he


attended the Columbia Bible College in Columbia, South Carolina. Long married Lethia Propst and the couple had three children: Stanley, Christine, and Kelly Anne.

Long surrendered to God's call to preach in 1959 and was ordained in 1960 at West End Baptist Church.

He served at Providence Baptist Church, in Leesville, South Carolina, for three and a half years, assisting in the construction of a parsonage and additional educational facilities.

Next, the Longs moved to Gaffney, South Carolina, where Dr. Long served as pastor of Crestview Baptist Church for four years. During this time the pastorium and other educational buildings were constructed. Church attendance was at an all-time high, and the number of baptisms was recordbreaking. Dr. Long continued this trend at Woodside Baptist Church in Greenville, South Carolina, where he served for two and a half years.

The Longs eventually left South Carolina and landed in Lithonia, Georgia, where Dr. Long served

as Lead Pastor at Glenwood
Hills Baptist Church for 20
years. During his tenure, the
church's membership grew
to over 2,700 and a strong
evangelistic outreach program
was established. Glenwood
Hills ranked among the top
in the state for the number
of baptisms and gifts to the
Cooperative Program. Dr. Long
relinquished his role as Senior
Pastor in January 1992 after over
30 years of pastoring Southern
Baptist Churches.

God then called Dr. Long to Luther Rice where he became the Director of International Ministries. The purpose of this new department was to train national pastors in foreign countries. This was a continuation of the Longs' extensive ministry to countries around the world. Dr. Long touched so many lives, brought countless individuals to Christ,

 and assisted in training and equipping leaders in order for them to make an impact for the kingdom of God.

Throughout the years, Dr. Long continued his education

receiving numerous degrees from Luther Rice. He served on various committees at the local, state, and national level of the Southern Baptist Convention.

Long wrote articles for Christian magazines and local newspapers and published a book entitled *In All Your Ways*. He also served on a number of boards, including the Home Mission Board, Refuge Crisis Pregnancy Center, and the Luther Rice Board of Trustees. Until he could no longer travel, the Longs went near and far to spread the Gospel. His reach is palpable and his legacy will last for generations to come.

I am writing to express to the Luther Rice family my great love and respect for Dr. Ronald B. Long.



Excerpts from Three Sermons by Dr. Long

November 3, 2011 ~ Luther Rice Chapel Service *"Sin of Arrogance"*

lames 4:13-17

"Come now, you who say, 'Today or tomorrow we will go to such and such a city, spend a year there, buy and sell, and make a profit'; whereas you do not know what will happen tomorrow. For what is your life? It is even a vapor that appears for a little time and then vanishes away. Instead you ought to say, 'If the Lord wills, we shall live and do this or that.' But now you boast in your arrogance. All such boasting is evil. Therefore, to him who knows to do good and does not do it, to him it is sin."

What does it mean to be crucified with Christ? What does it mean to be a servant for the Lord? What does it mean to humble yourself before the Lord?

It dawned on me that you better be careful about who you are and what you're doing. Because if arrogancy sets in, you will be capable of doing anything and everything. When arrogancy takes over our lives, it's easy to put everything else on somebody else — it's their fault. The two people we blame everything on is God and Mama — poor old Mama!

Ms. Bertha Smith always said, "Not I, but Christ." What happened to me is that I had clear cut goals, and in fifteen minutes, they were changed abruptly. I've got to be careful and acknowledge the fact that it is not me, but all in who He is. Ms. Bertha was right, I do have to crucify the flesh — I must die to myself and enthrone Christ in my life and not walk around like a grand peacock patting myself on the back, telling God, "you sure got a great prize when you got me!" You see, when God got me, He just got a bundle of sin.

What the book of James is teaching me is that you will travel if it is the will of God. I want to be at the center of His will for me. I want His best. I don't want His second best. I want the best He has for me. I want to give my life to who He is. There are times when I will get into it, and I'll do it, and I'll have to be reminded by the Holy Spirit of God that I better "back away, big boy, because I'm getting ready to mess some stuff up!" You'll travel, only if it is the will of God.

October 21, 2008 ~ Luther Rice Chapel Service "Bearing Fruit"

John 15:4-5

"Abide in Me, and I in you. As the branch cannot bear fruit of itself, unless it abides in the vine, neither can you, unless you abide in Me. I am the vine, you are the branches. He who abides in Me, and I in him, bears much fruit; for without Me you can do nothing."

Today we have all kinds of convictions and conventions on the "How to's of Ministry." I said to somebody some time ago, "we're going to do a convention for preachers." I mean, I love preachers, that's who I am and that's who I'll be, and when I go to heaven, I'll be a preacher. Let me suggest a convention for preachers. Let's have a national procrastinator's convention and that would get the brethren out! But if we're not going to have that,

then we'll have an FPA — a Fruit Pickers of America convention. We'll go to this convention and get all of the tools. We'll get tools on how to pick fruit. We'll get baskets and learn how to load up the baskets. We'll get seminars on how to pick it faster. And then, they'll bring in a top gun, an inspirational speaker that will have you jumping out of your shoes. You can't wait until you get out to go pick fruit. Only, a few days later you find yourself discouraged and somewhat disgusted. I'm not sure that the emphasis — well, I am sure in my humble but most accurate opinion — I am sure that the emphasis is not on picking fruit because lesus put the emphasis on bearing fruit. And there's a difference. You see, picking fruit takes time, effort, and energy, but bearing fruit is a product of a lifestyle, and there is a difference.

July 13, 2014 ~ The Path Worship Center ~ Augusta, GA "Heaven"

2 Timothy 4:6-8

"For I am already being poured out as a drink offering, and the time of my departure is at hand. I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith. Finally, there is laid up for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous Judge, will give to me on that Day, and not to me only but also to all who have loved His appearing."

In Thomas Payne's closing hours, he said, "I would give the world if I had not written The Age of Reason. It is hell to be left alone," and then he died. Now, folks, that is one way to die, and if you are without Jesus Christ this morning, that would be your way to die. But there is another way. I've always said this publically — God's people die well. I've been with so many when they were going on to glory and the angels of God carry them on in to meet the King of Kings and the Lord of Lords! God's people die well.

The last words of Dr. Lee were "Ah, there it is. I never did it justice." Implying that as he preached about heaven, he could not even come close to describing it. "I never did it justice!" Then all of a sudden he said,

"There's Mama!" Those were the words he used to describe his dear wife for years and years. And then he paused and said, "and there's Jesus"— and he went out and met the Lord. I'd rather go home like Dr. Lee than to go home like Thomas Payne.

Oh, what happens when we get to heaven? I'm going to give you two things it marks.

- I It marks an ending to this earthly life, to this earthly ministry. It'll come to an end. The struggles that we go through in our life will come to an end. One of the greatest desires that I have in my heart right now is I want to finish well. I want to finish well, brother. I don't want to go out a loser. I don't want to go out on the sideline. I want to go out in style. I want to keep the faith. But there will be no more death, no more sorrow, and no more pain.
- **2** It marks a beginning. It marks a revelation. Let me ask you, saints of God, do you love His appearing? Let me ask you, young people, if He would come today, would you be ready? I cannot imagine in my soul people going a day not knowing if they died if they would go to heaven. Glory to the King! Here I come. Get them ready!

My first experience with international missions came in the summer of 1993 while a college student at the University of Alabama at Birmingham. Our church, Liberty Baptist Church in Chelsea, Alabama, had been very active in local evangelism but had no real mission activity beyond our community. Our pastor, Dr. Jimmy Dean, completed his Doctor of Ministry degree through Luther Rice Seminary where he met Dr. Ron Long. He asked Dr. Long to help our church get involved in international missions. So, in the summer of 1993, we took our first international mission trip to Montego Bay, Jamaica, to conduct a vacation Bible school for the city children during the day and revival services in the evenings at a church
